


Harness racing is an easy target for lawmakers, just like the seal hunt was for activists. This sport is simply not very relevant in today's society.

If the pertinence of any industry is important in the changing world, how does harness racing become more relevant? Can it? I think it's an important question and I'll offer a few strategies that I think could help the cause.

First we must look to our equine counterparts, the thoroughbred racing industry, for guidance. It's no coincidence that when a sport is trial ballooned to be "banned" (or to have their funding eliminated or greatly reduced) there generally is a hierarchy – dogs, harness and the runners. Thoroughbreds are highest on the totem pole.

Thoroughbreds have remained relevant, certainly in part, through their events. Here are the Google searches for the Kentucky Derby versus various sporting events for 2016.

Sure, that's the Derby you might say, but it goes beyond



that. Let's ask Pennsylvania lawmakers what they might want to target first for a funding reduction – the sport which has attracted Kentucky Derby champions California Chrome and Nyquist to Parx, or the sport that races a whole whack of races with meagre attendance?

I don't want it to seem like I'm picking on Pocono or The Meadows. This is bigger than holding a few stakes races and inviting politicians; it needs to be industry led.

For example, where is the harness racing Triple Crown? I think it's somewhere in the attic, under the

How do they do it?

Niatross-over-the-hub rail issue of *Hoof Beats*. Despite someone in the industry talking about reviving it (seemingly) each year, it just goes back into the dusty attic until someone else brings it up again. It's the harness racing version of the summer solstice.

Harness racing will never possess anything as relevant as a Kentucky Derby; that's obvious, and it's just the way it is. But creating big events to be used as public relation vehicles and building a following for the sport — so those who hold the purse strings can see and touch it — should be a goal.

Second, let's move away from pure horse racing and head to the friendly confines of Alberta for the Calgary Stampede. Despite being plagued in animal activist hell (or if you prefer, "a spectacle of animal abuse"), this anachronistic, agrarian event somehow keeps rolling, with over one million in attendance each year along with full government support.

The Stampede has remained relevant because they've been cognizant to the writing on the wall and doing enough – while working with governments – to ensure its event is protected. In response to horse deaths in chuckwagon racing, they changed **the rules** on a dime, making the event much safer for athletes and more palatable to the public. In 2015 (for the first time ever), they **immediately banned a cowboy** who used the whip too aggressively in an event. Adding to the public relations power of the ban, the cowboy was the reigning world champion, not some also-ran.

With the Stampede there's no equivocation. There's no waffling. These things were just done.

Meanwhile in harness racing, to say it's not like this is putting it mildly.

If someone is charged with horse abuse in this sport, there's a good chance you'll see him or her back training in six months. This angers everyone, but it's a truism. If a school bus driver gets charged with drunk driving, the parents and school board will ensure he never drives anyone's kids to school again. If you abuse a horse, the USTA and the grassroots in the sport need to follow that lead.

In addition, eliminating a practice that has poor optics to politicians and the general public – like, for example, kicking – seems to be as difficult as landing someone on the moon. Scratch that. As this screenshot shows from way back in 1986, it's more difficult. The moon landing only took nine years to achieve.



The easiest way to stay irrelevant is to be paralyzed by dysfunction.

Last up in our quest for relevancy we'll fly into the world of milk. Yes, milk.

In 1984, American consumers drank about 26 gallons of milk, per capita, per year. In the same year, milk producers spent \$27 million on advertising through their slush fund.

More than two decades later, the industry had spent about \$1 billion cumulatively on advertising, and consumption dropped to just over 20 gallons per capita, per year.


That sounds like some pretty terrible marketing spend, doesn't it? No, not really, because milk producers weren't only talking to consumers with their public relations and

marketing campaigns, they were speaking to those who held all the money – politicians. That worked exactly as planned. Since the mid-1990's, subsidies for the milk industry are over \$5.6B, and they're not going anywhere.

It's pretty difficult to say no to Doogie Howser. And it's a heck of a lot easier to hold onto government support when you stay relevant.

Harness racing – and again, this is no secret – has a relevancy problem. But, with foresight and planning (and probably a little slice of the billions in slot revenue) there are things that can be done. Thoroughbred racing, the Calgary Stampede and dairy farming are all present day examples of old time agrarian businesses and events that have remained relevant. Harness racing can learn from them, if we're willing to listen.



### What a drag!

Harness racing drag kings and why zero never equals zero by Bill Finley

It's the first race on a Tuesday night at Northfield Park, the horses are leaving the paddock and the clock reads one minute to post. The clock is lying, and everyone knows it.

Seven minutes later and six minutes after the minutes to post on the toteboard and television screens was listed as zero, the race finally started. It was not, of course, an aberration, but business as usual, not just at Northfield but at every pari-mutuel harness track in the U.S.

Harness Racing Update (HRU) tracked the first 11 races on Tuesday at Northfield and the closest any race came to going off on time was 6:13 after post time and the latest was 7:56 after the supposed post.

On the surface it seems ridiculous. Zero equals four or maybe six and, sometimes, nine. It's a system that has evolved over time. Dave Bianconi, Northfield's executive vice president of racing and simulcasting, said the delayed post system has its remnants in the days before there was advance deposit wagering (ADW) and simulcasting, when track managers would look down and see lines at the window and delay the race for a few minutes until everyone had got their bet in. It has grown from there and, frankly, turned into something that is completely out of control.

"When it comes to dragging past listed post time it drives me crazy," said Meadowlands general manager Jason Settlemoir. "It's very, very frustrating and I know it's very frustrating to the customers, as well."

Yet, the Meadowlands is among the worst offenders. Settlemoir said that the track's policy is to start a race six minutes after the clock hits zero. He said that if a Meadowlands race is in danger of being run at the same time as a race from Mohawk or Woodbine, the drag can be longer than six minutes.

Different track managers will give you different explanations for why they drag their races out, but no matter what they may say the central point is they feel it's the best way to maximize handle.

"We have no gaming on our end so everything we have is generated by handle," Hawthorne spokesman Jim Miller said. "We have to do everything we can to maximize handle. With us, a lot depends on other tracks and what they are doing. My focus is on doing everything possible to avoid the big dogs because that's where the betting dollar is most likely going to go instead of to us. I do everything to avoid the Meadowlands, and try to do same with Mohawk and Woodbine. We're trying to find that slot. You look at the drag and the last thing you want is your race going off when one of those other tracks is a half-mile into their race."


Miller said Hawthorne's drag is normally around four minutes but will be adjusted if that schedule puts them in conflict with an off time at larger tracks.

Northfield has a reputation of dragging its races out longer than any other track. Last week, HRU recorded a Northfield race that went off 10:13 minutes after post time. The reason they do it? Because it works, Bianconi said.

"It's not just Northfield, it's every track," he said. "I even see a lot of thoroughbred tracks now where they are doing it. If it didn't work (to create more handle) why then is everyone doing it?"

Gulfstream Park, the most popular betting signal in North America at this time of year, has fallen in love with the drag concept. Gulfstream races typically go off about six minutes after post time.

HRU did a random sampling and could not find any harness tracks that started their races anywhere near the zero-minutes-to-post point. Two races at Yonkers on Feb. 14



went off at 4:01 and 3:51 after post time. Recently, three races from Monticello went off at an average of 5:09 after the clock hit zero, while the 7th at The Meadows went off 4:05 after post time and the second at Dover Downs went off at 6:24 after post time.

One would think bettors wouldn't be the least bit fooled by the games tracks play with posts, that would know they don't even have to consider making a wager until at least three or four minutes after post time. Bianconi argues that with the majority of players playing off track and playing multiple signals that's not the case.

"You see people at a simulcast facility that are betting multiple tracks and they look up and see zero and they're not really sure if it's right at zero or there are two or three minutes to go," he said. "If you're just betting Northfield maybe you know. But if you're betting six tracks you don't know and I think those are the people who will be led to place a bet at your track because they see the zero and they don't know if they have time to wait."

But what if every track simply sent their races off when the clock hit zero? Wouldn't gamblers quickly adjust. Track executives say no.

"When Jeff (Gural) first took over the Meadowlands (in 2012) he tried to go on post time and the handle dropped immediately, something like 10 per cent," Settlemoir said.

"Jeff and I met with one of the larger gamblers around and talked to him about post times and he said you need to go as long as possible after zero because that increases handle. His explanation was that that gives gamblers more time to watch things and see what the final odds are going to be. I'm guessing it's been so ingrained in our customers for so many years that no one wagers until the very last minute."

Settlemoir and others believe the only way the industry could go back to running on time is if all tracks agreed to do.

"In my perfect world zero would be zero and every track would honor that," Miller said. "That's what I think it should be."

"I certainly can't go it alone because my handle would drop off a cliff if I did," Settlemoir said. "If everybody were to start doing it at the same time I think there's an excellent chance nobody's handle would fall as soon as people realized zero minutes to post means zero minutes to post."

That would, of course, require cooperation among every facet of an industry known for its inability to cooperate. It looks like zero will continue to equal anything but zero.


"Maybe it's your lucky lady sweater," said Carl. God, I hope not.

# BETWEEN THE LINES



## Time to make electronic past performances free

Rhetoric on how to grow harness racing has increased of late as the United States Trotting Association (USTA) gets set to elect a new president on Monday (Feb. 27). But for all of the visions and ideas put forth by the various candidates, the most obvious issue that holds back the sport, as far as I'm concerned, was elusive.

At the most fundamental level, harness racing is a sport whose success should be related to the amount of race handle its member tracks are able to generate. In order to bet however, horse past performances are a necessity and in the U.S. this information comes at a price.

Due to agreements set in place by the USTA, tracks are unable to disseminate their own past performances electronically with consumers, unless they have a separate agreement with Trackmaster, which holds the rights to the past performance data. Under the deal, tracks may print and distribute free past performances to patrons. But even banning electronic dissemination of past performance lines does place restrictions on accessing data needed to bet.

The industry model is flawed, reflects backward thinking and is a clear detriment to the growth of the sport. It's undeniable that the free flow of data — strictly referring to only past performance program data in this case — will lead to greater customer engagement.

At the heart of these agreements is the one in particular formed with Trackmaster in 1997. Sold to the thoroughbred company Equibase in 2000, Trackmaster has been given exclusive rights by the USTA to be the only provider of electronic past performances, although in 2012 the *Daily Racing Form* was able to enter into the arrangement, as well. Over the course of this time, all harness tracks in the U.S. have been barred from disseminating past performance data

electronically directly to its customers, even though the data originates from the tracks themselves.

The question for the USTA becomes, why not simply make past performance data available for free electronically? Impossible, you say?

In Canada, the equivalent of the USTA is Standardbred Canada (SC) and guess what? They make their data available for all Canadian tracks and past performances are provided by each track to customers totally free of charge. You can go to any track's website — whether it be a large one such as Woodbine or a smaller one such as Western Fair — and right there are free program links for complete race cards.

The free flow of program data could be one of many factors that has led to higher handle in Canada. Though, the gap in the exchange rate on the U.S. and Canadian dollars is certainly another factor. Comparing 2016 over 2015, total harness handle in Canada increased from \$460 million to \$469.7 million, that's up 1.97 per cent. Over the same time period, total harness handle in the U.S. dropped by 4.66 per cent. At the same time, handle per race in Canada actually beat handle in the U.S. (\$38,066 to \$37,325). The difference in past performance availability isn't, of course, the sole reason for the differing handle trends between the two countries, but it would be foolish to not think it's not part of the equation. Anecdotally speaking, I find myself playing Canadian harness tracks more than ever before due to the free access of data.

For the foreseeable future, it's highly unlikely to see the USTA allow tracks to distribute past performance content to customers in the same manner that SC does. The reason being that the USTA would prefer not to lose the revenue stream it derives from Trackmaster.

Don't misunderstand. My issue isn't that the USTA (a non-profit organization) is leveraging its relationship with Trackmaster to be profitable, but rather they are doing it at the expense of what is in the best interest of the sport. This is a case of the USTA's interests not lining up with the

interest of the -overall health and well-being of the sport.

Despite the agreement, certain tracks have still tried to issue their own programs for free knowing that it will help grow their own product but have been shut down by Trackmaster. At one point in January of 2011, Pompano Park briefly put out free past performances electronically which contained only the data it sends to the USTA in the first place, (essentially the same data content you see in Canadian programs) but still had to cease those actions because it was still found to be in violation of the exclusive Trackmaster agreement. The absurdity of it is astounding.

What is so unique or proprietary about past performances that it shouldn't be made publicly available for free to begin with? Data contained in racing result charts is no different than what you would see in a box score for any major sport.

I don't agree with it at all, but I could more easily see if the USTA wanted to hold onto that raw data itself so that people wouldn't have the opportunity to ultimately develop their own sets of ratings which would be a competitive threat to Trackmaster. But I'm not even asking that much. All I'm saying is that consumers should be given free access to past performances that tracks already wish to issue in a format where they can't practically be used for anything other than handicapping, and if at that point a person wants a more detailed program that contains speed and class ratings such as the Trackmaster ones do, then they can pursue that as their own preference.

Both the USTA and SC already produce revenue from data they keep to themselves in the form of online services Pathway and TrackIT, respectively, although an argument can be made that this information also should be made publicly available. But even though some of the data that these services charge for is available for free in thoroughbred racing, charging money for this information isn't dissuading new interest in the sport the way that lack of free electronic program accessibility does.

First and foremost, exclusive rights over program content needs to end one way or the other. For all of the talk about taking a small percentage of slot money and using it towards marketing of the sport, perhaps it can be used to help offset revenue that would be lost if the USTA chose to make programs available in the same manner that SC already does.

I don't know how feasible of an idea it is, but it's nonetheless the kind of forward thinking mindset that the next USTA president should have and be willing take on.

Race 6: PARNU HANOVER has gone a number of fast miles of late and now switches from Marcus Miller to Andy Miller; has plenty of speed to burn and will be the one to run down. ROCKEYED OPTIMIST makes his second start back and picks up Campbell; wasn't overly inspiring last out and still might need one more to race back into shape. DYNAMIC YOUTH will be going forward early and this field isn't as tough as what he was up against last week. K-LEES SHAKENBAKE didn't seem to have his usual kick in his last pair although both those races were won by sharp foes; EASTEND EDDIE qualified well in his return for Burke.

### A junky start

How starting positions need to be more equitable.

After playing football as a freshman, I made my first career move. I took up high jumping, a non-strenuous sport where opposing players did not try to maim me. Seriously, as a high jumper, you lounge in the pit (a soft foam rubber landing area) and work on your tan. Disregarding the five-step run-up preceding the jump, and just counting the time air born, my total amount of "action" lasted 12 seconds. This was fine; it allowed me plenty of time to ogle girls.

High jumping, or in my case, semi-high jumping, is a very primitive sport where a human being (or teenager) attempts to soar over a stick. High jumping is somewhat boring and like most sports, somewhat stupid. However, one thing you have to concede about high jumping — it is very fair. We did not have springs in our shoes, helium balloons around our waists, or run up a ramp for a head start.

One day, Mr. Rademaker, our track coach, strolled over, tapped me on the shoulder and grumbled, "Raymond Tetherfield was just kicked off the team for smoking behind the bleachers; you're running the first leg of the half-mile relay." He finished this shocking request by saying, "Just stay in lane four, the far outside lane, run as fast as you can, and hand the baton to Albert Smithers."

Mr. Rademaker escorted me to the starting blocks and gave me some instructions that I immediately forgot. I was delighted to see that my starting blocks were several yards in front of lane three and many yards in front of lanes two and one.

The starter pistol cracked.

I was ahead, the other three hopefuls in my rear view mirror. Arms pumping, mullet hair flying, I immediately dubbed myself "The Rocket of Cuyahoga County." This euphoria lasted approximately eight seconds. At that point, runners from lanes one, two and three loomed into my side view mirror. When a scowling Albert Smithers almost received the baton (I dropped the damn thing), I was looking at the taillights of all other competitors.

My first reactions were presidential; blame everyone else — Raymond Tetherfield for negligence in rule breaking, Coach Rademaker for sending me out unprepared and the obvious Machiavellian configuration of the track. Reality set in. The coach was doing his job. My Winstons were in Ray Tetherfield's possession when he got pinched, and our losing had nothing to do with where I started; in the next heat, the kid running in lane four handed the baton to his partner five yards in front of the other runners.

This is a long-winded introduction to the reconfiguration challenge of today – Improve the absolute unfairness of an outside post position.

This bias to outsiders has been a pet peeve of mine since discovering the sport. High school track teams address this issue; harness racing does not. While griping about this unfair travesty for over a decade, I usually get a tepid response like, "Yeah, getting stuck with an outside post is a bummer."

To me, the inequity is more than a bummer; it is strange. Every horse should have an equal distance to travel regardless of assigned post position. I just looked up Yonkers stats and found that your chances of winning a race from post position number eight are around two per cent and I am surprised it is that high. A starting post scraping the outside fence can make a race unbeatable, unwatchable and unconscionable.

Any person capable of simple mathematic calculations and physics (which excludes me) could easily analyze how much of a distance each post position should be ahead of post one to make the distance traveled equal.

Just using the junk box from last week (full story here), the items in this pile offer hints to improve fairness. I am not even going to limit myself to a single proposal. In five seconds I can think of five ways to make the postpositions more equitable. You can probably come up with another five if you have an open mind.

• Using ultra-lightweight thermoplastic composite material, the starting gate should be re-engineered so the outside posts are tilted forward significantly so the race will be equitable. Not only is this fair, viewers would get a complete view of their horse at the start.

- There should be individual lanes for the first 1/8 of a mile; each horse covering this part of the race in their own lane would cause less interference. At the end of the first 1/8 all will have covered the same distance, and THEN drivers vie for position near the coveted rail.
- We could use a laser beam or a laser curtain instead of a fence.
- Even better, get rid of the clunky cars and trucks. An obtrusive and jarring motorized vehicle as an integral part of a sporting event like a horse race is inane. Use a beam or another method to start a race from OFF the track surface.
- What about an audio cue that instructs the driver via headphones on their proper placement at the start of a race from sensors below the surface?

Imagine the start of a horse race without the obtrusive

vehicle that can scare horses and cause accidents. Imagine a staggered start that allows viewers to see every single horse. Imagine a race where the eight horses each travel the identical distance. Imagine a race with more action because there will be decisions to make at every step in the race, especially the second quarter when the drivers will decide to push forward or save their horses. Imagine races with fewer chalk and tosses.

Cheaper, fairer, more visually aesthetic, improved odds – what are we doing with the noses of our horses in an unfair line behind a big metal fence and a roaring vehicle?

## Waltzing around the track in Vienna, Austria

A New Year's Day trip to the Krieau track in the Austrian capital city.

On the last day of 2016, I enjoyed an evening of festivities at the Hofburg Palace in Vienna, the 2,600-room structure that was home of the Hapsburg Empire for centuries. I was there for one of the famed Vienna New Year's Eve Balls, where women in glittering dresses and men in tuxedos dance the Viennese Waltz.

On the first day of 2017, I did something far more enjoyable: I went to the trotting races at the Krieau track in Vienna.

The Hapsburg Empire is just a faded memory in Vienna

now and the trotting grandeur of Austria has also faded badly.

Krieau is the second-oldest track in Europe after the Central Moscow Hippodrome (which I visited in 1989).

Today Krieau has a modern grandstand in addition to historic grandstands that are no longer used but are protected and preserved as landmark structures.

Racing at Krieau the evening I was there was similar to what you find at many other European tracks. (Except in France. The French stand alone and above in their domination of European trotting.) The fields were large and many races were about 2,000 meters.

When I jumped into the taxi at the Hotel Intercontinental, where I was staying, the driver didn't know where Krieau was, but they all have GPS now and when I gave him the address we were off and weaving our ways through the dark streets of the historic city.

I've had the pleasure to visit many European cities and Vienna is certainly among the most fascinating. It's the city of Mozart and music, of the irresistible Sacher Torte, and the resplendent State Opera.

Parts of the city were badly damaged by bombs in World War II, but Vienna has been rebuilt into a mix of the old and new, and the historic "Inner city" is easily walkable and endlessly fascinating.

Krieau sits within a wooded park in the Leopoldstadt section of the city. When I got out of the taxi, I wasn't sure exactly how to enter the track as all I could see were trees, but I've been to enough racetracks to find my way.

Fortunately, I had arranged to connect with Nikolaus

Two things were prevalent at the Krieau track — Wienerschnitzel and beer.

Matzka, who produces the programs at Krieau. At many European tracks, the program contains stories and photos in addition to the usual race listings and past performances.

Matzka is a knowledgeable pedigree devotee with comprehensive knowledge of trotting bloodlines around the world. He writes regularly on trotting pedigrees.

When Matzka visited Red Mile last October, he made a pilgrimage to the centerfield in the track's final turn. There is a grave marker there above the final resting spot of Miss Bertha Dillon,

an exceptional filly on the track a century ago and an even more exceptional broodmare. She played a monumental role in the foundation of Hanover Shoe Farms' broodmare band. Matzka routinely refers to the descendents of Miss Bertha Dillon as "the best family."

Trotting in Austria was formally organized in 1874 when the Wiener Trabrenn Verein (basically Vienna Trotting Association) was formed.

The first president was Count Kalman Hunyady, essentially the "George Washington of Austrian trotting." Hunyady was a Hungarian nobleman born in 1828. (Remember that until the end of World War I almost a century ago, Vienna was the seat of power in the Austria-Hungarian Empire.)

Hunyady died in 1901, but he is still honored with an international race at Krieau.

The Hunyady Memorial has long been a prize for some of the best trotters in Europe. Many Swedish stars, such as Meadow Road, Queen L, Piper Cub, and Mustard have won it. The American export Eileen Eden also won it.

Florestan and Granit, two sons of the immortal French mare Roquepine and influential sires, also won the Hunyady Memorial. The event is contested over 2,650 meters or about 1.6 miles.

While at Krieau, I had a beer (naturally) with Nikolaus. But how many tracks have you visited that offer a Wienerschnitzel sandwich?

Vienna in German is "Wien," so Wienerschnitzel is simply a

"Vienna schnitzel." And it was delicious.

As we roamed the track, Matza introduced me to a regular bettor, who greeted me by saying, "Yes, I saw you at the 1978 Hambletonian."

I was stunned. All I could manage to say was, "Speedy Somolli. That was my first Hambletonian."

"First for me, too," he replied.

I'm always thrilled to explore a new racetrack and I enjoyed my visit to Krieau. I'd love to go back when the weather is a bit warmer.

Matzka reminded me of the role France plays in sustaining European trotting because French bettors play significant sums on the races at Krieau and there was a race that night designed for French trotters.

Learning more about the world of harness racing is endlessly fascinating and I prefer Viennese trotting to the Viennese waltz.

# Ten years later, the mystery remains: Who killed Randy Rankin?

Ten years after Ontario horseman, children's entertainer and outspoken harness racing critic Randy Rankin was shot and killed in his home, Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) are still looking for his killer, according to an article by Steve Fischer posted on the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation's (CBC) website on Tuesday (Feb. 21) (full story here).

"Rankin was sitting at his computer desk in the basement of his home in the village of Morewood, southeast of Ottawa, in the early morning hours of Feb. 12, 2007, when someone snuck up to the window and fired a gun through the glass, hitting the 47-year-old in the back of the head. His wife and daughter, who were upstairs at the time, ran to the basement to find him dead," Fischer wrote.

Rankin bought and trained a few horses and also was well-known as a children's entertainer who used the names Lunchbox Louie and Koo Koo the Clown.

He was an outspoken online critic about what he viewed as corruption in the eastern Ontario harness racing industry and his brother, Gary, said Randy had received threatening phone calls prior to being killed.

"Randy was one of four defendants named in a \$6.25-million lawsuit launched by the Ontario Harness Horse Association over comments on a public discussion board. It was later settled. But according to Gary Rankin, his brother had vowed to publicize more information in the days before his death," Fischer wrote.

The OPP said it had "lots of persons of interest" in the case. But no arrests have been made, even after the province in 2009 offered a \$50,000 reward for information leading to an arrest

Gary Rankin said he has decided to speak out now, hoping that after a decade someone will finally come forward with what they know about his brother's murder.

### Mission Brief retired and sold

Standardbred Canada reported Wednesday (Feb. 22; full story here) that world champion trotting mare Mission Brief has been retired from racing and sold for \$650,000 to a group led by Steve Stewart of Hunterton Farms of Paris, KY.

Mission Brief (Muscle Hill—Southwind Serena) didn't race at four after suffering an injury while preparing for her 2016 campaign. Campaigned by trainer Ron Burke for Weaver Bruscemi, Burke Racing Stable, Our Horse Cents Stable and J&T Silva Stables, Mission Brief retires with 19 wins and three seconds in 27 career starts with \$1,599,587 in earnings.

At two, Mission Brief's nine victories included the \$352,050 Merrie Annabelle, \$500,000 Breeders Crown and a 1:50.3 world record at The Red Mile on her way to divisional honors in the U.S.

At three, her 10 wins included the \$307,040 Elegantimage, \$185,000 Zweig Filly and \$174,000 Moni Maker while repeating divisional accolades. She also raced against her male peers in the Hambletonian, capturing her elimination before finishing second in the \$1 million final. She was named Three-Year-Old Trotting Filly of the Year in both Canada and the U.S. She took her mark of 1:50.2 in her penultimate start, winning the 2015 Matron at Dover Downs in world record time.

Stewart is one of Mission Brief's breeders and consigned her to the 2013 Lexington Selected Yearling Sale where she sold for \$150,000.

The group of new owners also includes Quebec's George Lowenfeld — known more commonly by his stable Andrea Lea Racing Stables, like Stewart one of Mission Brief's breeders — and Indiana's John Schmucker.

Stewart said he hasn't decided who to breed Mission Brief to, but it will likely be Father Patrick, Cantab Hall or Chapter Seven.


of the handicapper who has the highest net profit in the contest. Rescue assignments will be drawn prior to the contest kick-off.


